For young learners in particular, music creates positive emotional connections with Welsh. Singing along, dancing, and taking part in whole-school celebrations helps children associate the language with enjoyment and success. These positive experiences are key to developing confidence and encouraging learners to use Welsh naturally in everyday life.

Celebrating Dydd Miwsig Cymru also supports the wider goal of Cymraeg 2050, Wales' ambition to reach one million Welsh speakers. By encouraging learners to engage with Welsh outside of lessons, we help create a culture where the language is heard, valued, and used more often.

Even if you don't speak Welsh fluently, Dydd Miwsig Cymru is designed to be inclusive — enjoying music together is a brilliant way to connect with Welsh culture and language as a family.
